<b>Pope</b>	<p>Head of the church. The pope oversees the Catholic Church and its faithful from his home in the Vatican City, and independent nation situated in Rome.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><i>Pope Francis</i> <b>vatican.va</b></p>	<p><b>The Catholic Church</b></p> 
<b>Cardinal</b>	<p>Appointed by the pope. As a body, the College of Cardinals advises the pope and, on his death, elects a new pope. Most have additional duties, such as leading a diocese or archdiocese or managing a department of the Roman Curia.</p>	
<b>Archbishop</b>	<p>An archbishop is a bishop of a main or metropolitan diocese, also called an archdiocese. A cardinal can concurrently hold the title.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><i>Cardinal Blasé J. Cupich</i> <b>archchicago.org</b></p>	<p><b>Archdiocese</b></p> <p><i>Chicago</i></p>
<b>Bishop</b>	<p>A bishop, like a priest, is ordained to this station. He is a teacher of church doctrine, a priest of sacred worship, and a minister of church government. <b>Priest</b>	<p>An ordained minister who can administer most of the sacraments, including the Eucharist, baptism, and marriage. He can be with a particular religious order or committed to serving a congregation.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><i>Rev.
